Lenten Regulations

All Catholics 14 years & older must abstain from meat on Fridays of Lent, Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.

All Catholics between 18 & 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

To fast means to eat one full meal; the other two meals that day should be less than the normal amount unless they are already at a minimum for good health. Eating between meals is not permitted: however, liquids including coffee, milk and fruit juices are allowed.

End of Mass

Question: Is it ever Ok to leave Mass before it ends? Answer: This is an interesting question because beneath the surface there seems to be an assumption that if it's okay, then why do we have to stay after we receive communion? The short answer is "no," but we definitely want to go a bit deeper as we consider why.

First, when we think about questions like this, we must consider this in adult terms. If there is something gravely important that we need to do, then we must attend to that. However, if it is a matter of convenience or preference, then we really have to stop and think again. First, while we always want to recognize the importance of sacramental communion in the Mass, we also need to understand how important the time of thanksgiving and prayer after communion is. This is summarized in the Prayer After Communion offered by the celebrant and then we are also commissioned to "Go forth" during the Dismissal of the Mass, reminding us that we have been entrusted with a gift — the Word of God and the Presence of Christ in the sacrament — and that we are to share that gift with others.

If we simply leave after we receive communion, we risk two things. First, there is the possibility that we will turn our reception of communion into a purely personal, individual experience that is separated from our common experience of worship — and communion in the fullest sense — and, second, we lose an opportunity for gratitude and serious reflection if we simply leave after communion. This time of thanksgiving, reflection, and, ultimately, missioning, are important and, in the end, an essential part of the celebration of the Mass. LPI

Peace and grace to all!

Both the first and second readings this weekend refer to how those suffering with the effects of sin should be treated. In the first reading, the individual with a sore is to present himself to the priest for inspection, and the priest is supposed to determine whether or not the individual is unclean. In those days, there was a lot of fear and concern for contagious diseases and due to that, there were many declared unclean and ostracized from the community even if they didn't have leprosy. The people avoided them and shunned them--mostly out of fear and ignorance. came at a time when the person afflicted needed support and assistance the most! Imagine if you got sick and as a result, everyone rejected vou. Of course one of the allegorical meanings of leprosy is sin and in this case, it is a serious sin that separates someone from the life-giving presence of the community. The leper in the story has enough courage to approach Jesus and make a request in faith. When everyone else turned away, Jesus remained unafraid and compassionate. That is because Jesus did not come to condemn, but to save! Jesus came to be the bridge, the transcendence that crosses over the chasm that fear, ignorance and sin have brought into our lives. ignorance, bigotry, hardheartedness, isolation and marginalization are realities in the lives of people today. It includes the poor, the sick, the migrant, the addict, the prostitute, the post abortive, the abused, those of different cultures and faith traditions than our own, and those who do not vet understand the Gospel of Life. For many, there is an inclination to be hard of heart, reject and ostracize others who have a different perspective than our own; just look at Big Tech and the mainstream media. The challenge against such an attitude, is to not let the darkness take over our hearts and prevent us from reaching out to others. If we separate ourselves from the Church, we separate ourselves from Jesus and we cannot bring the healing that Jesus wants to work through us. It also requires us to be mature in our personal dispositions and faith so that we too may experience healing and grow in holiness. God bless you all!+++ Fr. Peter
